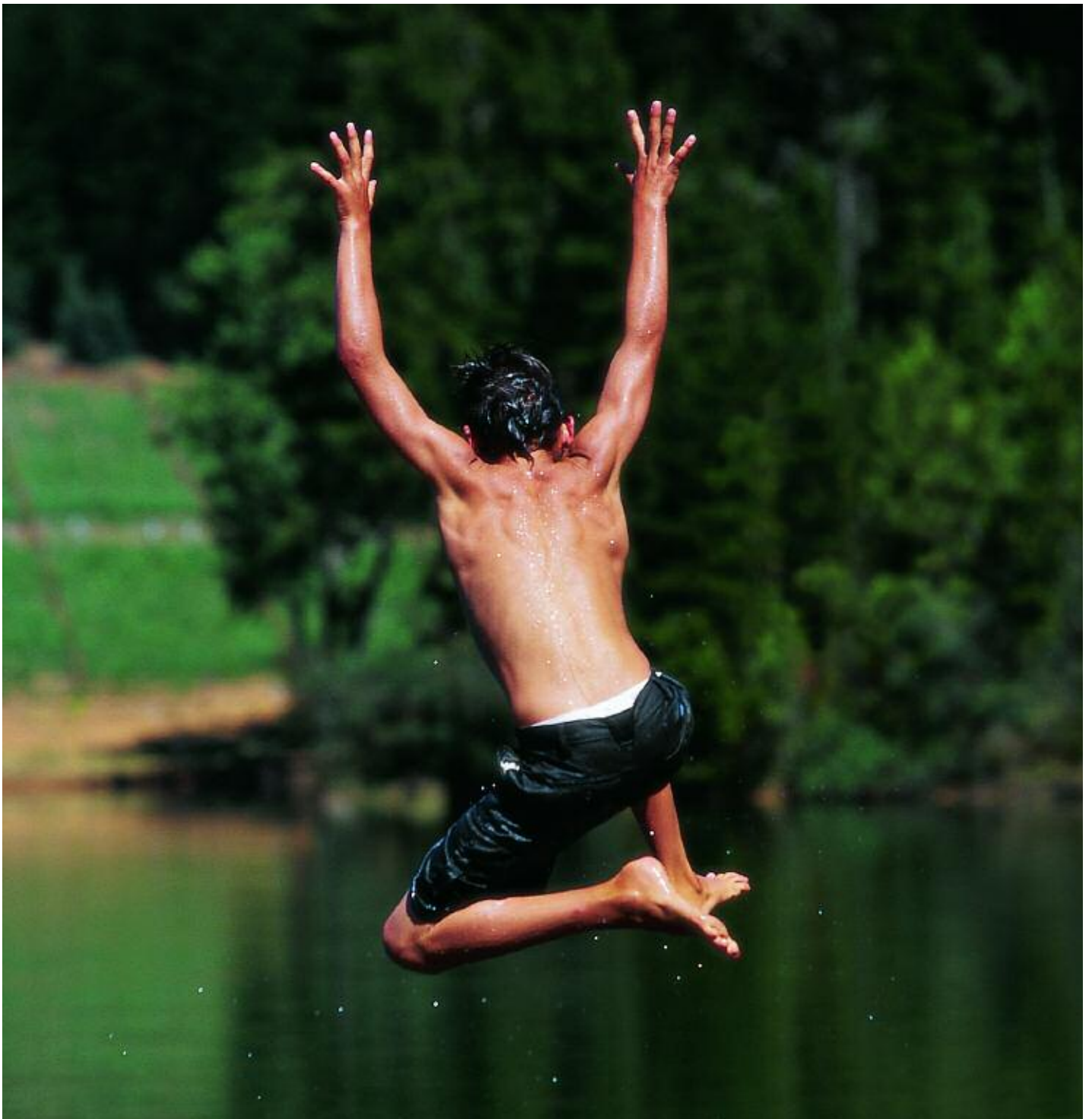

Reach of the Award:

Of the total participants in the Award at any one time (225,000):

- 1,200 Award Groups attracted young people from ethnic minority communities (+49% on last year).*
- 3,121 had a disability (as defined in the Disability Discrimination Act). (+16.6% on last year).*
- 39,620 were from an ethnic minority background (+35% of the figure reported in 2003/2004).*
- The Award is represented in around **68%** of State Secondary schools in the UK.
- The Award is represented in around **85%** of Independent Secondary schools in the UK.
- The Award is represented in **14%** of Special Schools in the UK.

*Connexions Definition of disadvantaged young people as those "who are outside learning or at risk of underachieving". Using this definition, disadvantaged young people are: Likely to include some young people from the following groups:

- Some minority ethnic groups
- Young people with disabilities
- Young people with health problems
- Young people with language difficulties
- Young people with numeracy and literacy needs
- Young people with learning difficulties

And may include:

- Pregnant teenagers and teenage parents
- Young people with substance misuse problems
- Young people who are homeless or looked after
- 16-18 year olds who need additional help to enter mainstream learning (e.g. through the Learning Gateway)
- Young people re-entering the labour market or entering late
- Young offenders
- Young people from neighbourhoods with significantly lower participation and achievement levels than typical.



Awards gained:

In 2004/05, 38,932 young people gained a Bronze Award, 13,527 gained a Silver Award and 5,605 gained a Gold Award, making a total of 58,063. Overall, the total number of Awards gained increased by 7.8% in 2004/05, over the previous year.

In achieving their Awards during 2004/2005 young people spent over four million hours on sport and skill, gave in excess of two million hours of service to the community. In the Expeditions Section they collectively walked, rode, canoed or sailed over one million miles and over two million miles including practice expeditions.

History of the Award

- 1934 Moray Badge started at Gordonstoun School by Kurt Hahn, headmaster and educationalist.
- 1941 County Badge adopted in Morayshire.
- 1956 Pilot Duke of Edinburgh's Award for Boys started under Chairmanship of HRH The Duke of Edinburgh. Sir John (later Lord) Hunt appointed Director. The Award has four Sections: Rescue & Public Service, Expeditions, Pursuits & Projects, and Fitness.
- 1957 7,000 boys have started Awards, 1,000 Awards have been gained.
- 1958 The Duke of Edinburgh's Award for Girls is piloted - with its own programme: Design for Living, Adventure, Interests and Service, First Gold Awards gained. Pilot projects start in eleven Commonwealth countries.
- 1959 The Duke of Edinburgh's Award set up as a charitable trust.
- 1960 35,000 boys and 7,000 girls taking part.
- 1966 3 Area and 3 Regional Offices now running in the United Kingdom. The Award now operates in 22 countries worldwide. Sir John Hunt retires as Director & is succeeded by Alfred Blake.
- 1969 The Duke of Edinburgh's Award for Young People (both men and women) aged 14 to 21 launched. The Service, Expeditions and Interests Sections were available at all levels to everyone whilst at Bronze and Silver young women took Design for Living and young men Physical Activity. At Gold participants could choose between the latter two Sections, and had to complete a Residential Project.
- 1975 One million young people have taken part in the Award since 1956.
- 1978 Robert Heron succeeds Sir Alfred Blake as Director.
- 1980 The next major revision - one programme for all young people between the ages of 14 and 25: Service, Expeditions, Skills and Physical Recreation, with an additional Residential Project at Gold.
- 1987 The 100,000th Gold Award presented. HRH The Prince Edward gains his Gold, and sets up Special Projects Committee to fund outreach projects.
- 1988 Major General Michael Hobbs succeeds Robert Heron as Director. The International Award Association is established.
- 1989 Two million young people have started the Award since 1956.
- 1992 Charter for Business launched, recruiting major businesses to support the Award financially and by promoting it to their staff. Over one million Awards have been gained.
- 1998 Vice Admiral Mike Gretton succeeds Michael Hobbs as Director.
- 2000 The programme revised to allow participants to choose the Section on which they will spend the longest time. 103,000 new entrants and over 48,899 Awards were gained in the past year.
- 2001 The Duke of Edinburgh celebrates his 80th Birthday, and hands over the Chairmanship of Trustees to Sir Tom Farmer. Prince Philip remains as Patron. The Duke of Edinburgh's Award in the UK celebrates its 45th birthday.
- 2004 Expeditions Section completely overhauled to include more flexibility whilst retaining the challenge. David Hempleman-Adams appointed as 50th Anniversary Project Director. Michael Gretton retires as Award Director. Over 137,000 young people enter for an Award each year.
- 2005 Peter Westgarth appointed Chief Executive (August). Number of young people entering for an Award each year tops 145,000.
- 2006 The Duke of Edinburgh's Award celebrates its 50th Anniversary.
